Vice Presidents Reports

How can we shine a light on missions?

That was the question I asked at a recent zone presidents meeting and I was overwhelmed with wonderful ideas. Some LWML groups highlight an LWML mission, using a story and devotion published on lwml.org during each monthly meeting; some groups post a "Mission of the Month" on their bulletin board, using the posters available on wa-aklwml.org; some have a periodic visit to the congregation from a caped "Mighty Mite" who points to how God uses the mite box to support His missions; some use a "Loud" mite offering in metal buckets to "drum" up support for missions; some put short mission descriptions in their church bulletins on the Sunday they collect mites; some include specific missions in their congregation's prayers of the church. Through our mite offerings and the ministries they support, we participate in sharing the gospel throughout the world! Praise the Lord! And he said to them, "Go into all the world and proclaim the gospel to the whole creation" (Mark 16:15).

How can we proclaim Christ and serve others in our everyday lives?

We are made to be God's hands and voice – and that means right where we live. For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, (Ephesians 2:10). You probably have your own ways to recharge your batteries and dedicate your days to the Lord. Maybe a routine of quiet time with your Bible and prayer, Portals of Prayer devotions, or the morning email with LWML Mustard Seed devotions. As I wake up each morning, I ask God to let me be a blessing that day – that He use my hands and intellect and speech to do His work. Of course, some days I'm not as useful as others! Pride, sin, and laziness get in the way! But because of Jesus, every morning I can start anew – praying and putting myself in His hands! 



Your mites are making a difference in God's Kingdom! Check out wa-aklwml.org to keep up-to-date on the district missions we have funded! Since the last newsletter, your mites were sent into God's Vineyard for the following missions:

• Lutheran Braille Workers' Seeing Christ Through Dots of Love Ministry was funded in the amount of \$5,000. Through this mission grant, your mites help fund an LBW project to share the Word of God with people in Africa who are blind, through the production and distribution of Braille volumes of Bibles and other Christian materials in multiple languages. These Braille books may be some people's first experience with the Word of God, a blessing that can enable them to live in the Light of Jesus! We pray that God continues to guide the hands of those who create these books and that, through these materials, many who live in darkness may know the love and perfect peace of our Savior! • Concordia Theological Seminary (CTSFW) Food for Seminary Students Ministry was funded in the amount of \$1,000. Through your mites and others, the Food Co-op at CTSFW is able to purchase perishable items for the use of seminary students and their families who may be experiencing financial difficulties as they study for the ministry. Nearly 60% of students are married, second career, with families. The Food Co-op is currently able to supply between 80% and 85% of their food needs each month at no cost to the student. We pray for those called to the ministry. Ease their worries about the daily needs of their families through this mission grant as they prepare to minister to our congregations and spread the Gospel as God leads!


- The grant is mission-focused and will share the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Heart to Heart Committee Kelsie Ingham, Chairman

One of the nine fruits of the spirit is kindness. I teach preschool and something I always ask my three- and four-year-old students is "was that a kind thing to do?" At that young age, they answer honestly ... if they threw a toy at a classmate, they will confess, "no, that wasn't kind." Sometimes they will even make it a point to tell me, "I helped clean up the crayons: I was very kind." As we become adults, some of those simple acts of kindness aren't as easy for us to do.

Most cultures see kindness differently. Some societies tend to view kindness as something extra that one person does for the other that isn't expected. In more community-focused societies, kindness is expected from everyone and is often done as a group effort. Our congregations are the latter type – if one of our members experiences a loss and is overcome by grief we, collectively, make meals for them, do housework for them, go to their home and visit with them, and so forth. Members of our congregation and religion, regardless of wealth, age, ethnicity, marital status... are part of our Christian family: bound together by our holy baptism into Christ.

District Zoom Coordinator/ Zone President Zoom Meetings Karen Williams



It was decided at one of our EC/BOD meetings in 2023 that it would be beneficial for our Zone Presidents to meet periodically outside of the regular District meetings to discuss subjects that were common at the Zone level. We started off with quarterly meetings. The Zone Presidents were enthusiastic about the past zoom meetings and encouraged by the request, they voted to hold monthly meetings. Each Zone President (in alphabetical order by zone name) presides over the one-hour session that is basically on one topic. The host Zone President decides on the topic.

The Board voted to establish an annual Zoom account for the district. President Carolyn appointed me the WA/AK District Zoom Coordinator this past October. The district is now the proud owner of a Zoom account that can be used for Zoom meetings.

Our first monthly Zoom Zone meeting was held October 2024 with Kim Collins, Zone President of Alaska, hosting the meeting. Because it was our first official monthly meeting, each member was given five minutes to share briefly about themselves as a "get acquainted" and then one or two goals which she hopes to focus on during the next biennium.

Wilma Gardner, Blue Mountain Zone President, hosted the November 2024 meeting. We discussed "How do you find the best ways to communicate with your own church ladies and then with the ladies in your zone?" We also discussed, "If you wrote an autobiography what would be the title?" Unfortunately, a few of the participants were unable to join us due to the terrible wind storms on the West side of the state. Power lines went down, Internet connections were up and down (mostly down), as well as Cell phone carriers were spotty at times.

Our December 2024 meeting was hosted by me representing East Inland Empire Zone. My discussion topics were "If you could change something about LWML, what would it be?" and "Have you ever invited your Pastor to join in one of your LWML meetings, zone rallies, etc.?" We had some great ideas from everyone during our time together. A variety of meeting schedule possibilities and how to encourage our younger women in the congregation were discussed. We all seem to keep our pastors abreast of what we are doing.

Solveig Shick, Hood Canal Zone President, hosted the January 2025 meeting. The topic of discussion centered around Missions. One of the questions posed was "How can we tie Mission Grants and Mite offerings together with our call to be Missionaries for Christ?" We also discussed "How can we better publicize the resources available at https://www.lwml.org/ and our own district website www.wa-aklwml.org/"

Our next Zone Presidents meetings are hosted by Nicole Knutsen, Inter-Valley Zone President (February 2025); Julia Sinclair, Lake Washington Zone President (March 2025); Judy Peraino, Mt. Baker Zone President (April 25); Sandi Hall, North Columbia Zone President (May 2025); Mary Abdi, Olympic Zone President (July 2025); Edie Norris, Rainier Zone President (August 2025); Mary Lynn Huntwork, South Columbia Zone President (September 2025)

It was decided to not have a meeting in June due to the national LWML convention in Omaha.

The highlight of the rally was a Bible study led by Aletha Voges on "Giving Thanks in All Circumstances."

The recipient of the ingathering of snack food, paper towels, and disposable gloves (for distributing the snacks) was All Saints Early Learning Center. At the Learning Center, the students (majority are from South Asia and are Hindu) learn of Jesus for the first time.

Julia Sinclair was elected President and Marie Chow was elected Secretary, each serving a two-year term. Ruth Ann Shimoi was elected Vice President, serving the remaining one-year vacancy of a two-year term. They join Treasurer Joanne Hopper on the zone executive committee.
